

Hero Worship

A study of some of the Church's teachings about Saints—Saints as examples of imperfect humans trying to live the life of Christ as best they can and as illustrations of the concept of theosis.

PRAYERS

OPENING PRAYERS—AKATHIST HYMN AND SMALL COMPLINE:

"Most glorious ever-virgin and blessed Theotokos, present our prayer to your Son, and our God, and through your intercession entreat Him to save our souls."

CLOSING PRAYERS—RESPONSES TO FIRST ANTI-PHON:

"By the intercessions of the Theotokos, Savior, save us. (3)"

SAINTS INHERIT THE KINGDOM OF HEAVEN AND ARE REWARDED BY GOD

Daniel 7:18: And the people of the Supreme God will receive royal power and keep it forever and ever.

PATRISTICS

St. Basil the Great: "He who touches the bones of a martyr becomes a partaker of the grace which flows forth from it." Because of such teachings of the Fathers we do not only venerate the relics of Saints, but also things that were intimately connected with them.

PASSAGES

SAINTS CONSTANTLY STRIVE TO BE HOLY BY IMITATING THE LORD

Leviticus 11:44-45: I am the Lord your God, and you must keep yourselves holy, because I am holy. I am the Lord who brought you out of Egypt so that I could be your God. You must be holy, because I am holy.

1 Corinthians 1:2:

To the church of God which is in Corinth, to all who are called to be God's holy people, who belong to him in union with Christ Jesus, together with all people everywhere who worship our Lord Jesus Christ, their Lord and ours.

PRAXIS

The Patristic position of the intercession of the Saints officially became a teaching of our Church at the Seventh Ecumenical Council. The Fathers present at the Council declared anathema those who do not profess that the Saints are righteous before the Lord, and do not call upon the intercession of the Saints, who were justly given the "right" to intercede on behalf of the whole world.
