# The Comprehensive Examination in Modern Greek

The Comprehensive Examination in Modern Greek is a foreign language achievement test that assesses student proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing Modern Greek. It is developed and administered by the Direct Archdiocesan District Office of Education of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America in collaboration with the New York City Department of Education. The Comprehensive Examination in Modern Greek is aligned to the checkpoint B learning standards for Languages Other Than English (LOTE), as described in the Syllabus: Modern Languages for Communication of the State Education Department, Albany, NY. The proficiency level of the Examination is equivalent to a third year of foreign language high school courses.

The *Comprehensive Examination in Modern Greek* is reviewed and evaluated by the World Languages Program/ Department of Linguistics/ University at Buffalo/ The State University of New York as well as the Institute of Modern Greek Studies / Aristotle University, Thessaloniki, Greece.

### **Examination Components**

The Comprehensive Examination in Modern Greek is comprised of the following four parts:

Part 1:	Speaking	(24 points)
Part 2:	Listening Comprehension	(26 points)
Part 3:	Reading Comprehension	(30 points)
Part 4:	Writing	(20 points)

#### NOTE:

Part 1 – Speaking is created from a list of tasks provided by the NY State Education Dept.

Part 2 – Listening and Part 3 – Reading is provided by the Direct Archdiocesan
District Office of Education / Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America
Part 4 – Writing is provided by the NYC World Languages Department since 2014.

### Eligibility

The *Comprehensive Examination* in *Modern Greek* is administered annually to students, in grades 8 and above, who have studied Modern Greek in a public, nonpublic, private school, or attained proficiency in the Modern Greek language outside a school setting.

In New York State, students who pass the *Comprehensive Examination* in *Modern Greek* may receive *three* high school credits in a foreign language. The passing grade is 65 for students who have three years of classroom instruction, while all others must achieve a score of 85 to receive credits.

Furthermore, the *Comprehensive Examination in Modern Greek* may afford high school students, who pursue studies in the Modern Greek language for more than **two** years, the opportunity to earn a Regents diploma with advanced designation (NYCRR §100.5[b][7][v][c]).

### **Student Preparation**

The Direct Archdiocesan District Office of Education has published a **Compilation** of past **Comprehensive Examinations in Modern Greek** (2003-2011) into **two** handbooks – one for the teacher and one for the student. The handbooks contain excellent material that may be used either for classroom instruction, or for student practice at home.

An *Appendix*, containing the most commonly used *words*, *phrases*, *basic grammar*, and *syntax*, accompanies the Student Edition. The Scoring Key and all pertinent forms for rating student performance are included in the Teacher Edition.

### **Teacher Preparation**

The Direct Archdiocesan District Office of Education has published **two Curricula** for the Modern Greek Studies (at **Checkpoint A** and **Checkpoint B**) to be used as a guide by the teachers who prepare students for the **Comprehensive Examinations in Modern Greek**.

The Curricula are in adherence with the philosophy and standards on the teaching of languages other than English (LOTE) of the New York State Education Department. They were developed by the Institute of Modern Greek Studies of the Aristotle University in Thessaloniki, Greece, in collaboration and under the direction of the Direct Archdiocesan District Office of Education of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America.

The Modern Greek Studies Curricula (*Checkpoint A and Checkpoint B* - Regents Level) are offered at no cost to teachers and schools.
