RE: **THE COMPREHENSIVE EXAMINATION IN MODERN GREEK**

Please be informed that the **Comprehensive Examination in Modern Greek** will be administered on **Monday, June 24, 2019**, at **1:15 p.m.**

Furthermore, please note that since 2012 the District Office of Education has been collaborating with the Literacy and Language Assessment Office/NYCDOE. Thus, the Greek Examination follows the directives of the New York City Department of Education.

Please proceed with registering the students who must be in the **eighth grade or higher** and have successfully completed, **three years** of studies in the Modern Greek language – past the age of ten – in order to qualify for the *Examination*.

2. *Sample* of a Certificate of Studies
3. Statement of Intent & Eligibility

Kindly follow the directions below:

- 1) Complete the **registration form** and **fax** it to our Office **as soon as possible**. OR call us to let us know the number of students who will be taking the examination this year.
- 2) Submit to our Office **by May 10, 2019**: 1) the **original registration form**; 2) the **certificate of studies**; and 3) the **Statement of Intent** for *each* of your students.

**Note:** *Only original documents will be accepted for registering your students.*

**NOTE:**

The *Comprehensive Examination in Modern Greek* is “a locally developed foreign language examination” aligned to the **Checkpoint B** learning standards for LOTE (Languages Other Than English) as described in the **Syllabus: Modern Languages for Communication** of the New York State Education Department. The *Examination* may afford high school students, who pursue studies in the Modern Greek language for more than two years, the opportunity to earn a **Regents diploma with advanced designation** (NYCRR §100.5[b][7][v][c]). Awarding of credits for foreign language studies, however, is at the discretion of the public or private school principal.
